Boldness is embedded in Union Presbyterian Seminary's DNA. Since its beginning as a pioneering institution on the Hampden-Sydney College campus, to its foresight in becoming an independent institution, to its commitment to prioritizing Christian education along with pastoral preparation, to its willingness to risk opening a second campus that embraces shifting educational needs, Union Presbyterian Seminary has demonstrated a tradition of boldness. For more than 200 years, Union Presbyterian Seminary has challenged its students to embody this characteristic in their own lives of faith and ministry by engaging in bold Christian service.

Birthed in 1812 from the cooperative work of two Presbyterian synods, Union Presbyterian Seminary represents a history of ever-expanding collaboration — educating pastors, teachers, missionaries, and scholars for service to Christ and the world. Intentionally, the Seminary seeks to be an advocate for Christ's good news of liberation, forgiveness, equality, and reconciliation, encouraging students, staff, and faculty to devote more of their energy to making a difference in the communities in which the Seminary is located and offering a positive witness to what God has done and is doing through this institution of the church.

Since 1898, one campus of the Seminary has been located in Richmond, Virginia. A second campus was started in 2002 in Charlotte on the campus of Queens University. In 2012, the Charlotte campus moved to its current location on Sharon Road. Most recently, the Seminary's bold vision of engaged, expansive Christian service has continued with the establishment of the Katie Geneva Cannon Center for Womanist Leadership and the Center for Social Justice and Reconciliation.

Today marks the seventeenth time commencement exercises have been held in Charlotte. In the 2020–2021 academic year, students at Union Presbyterian Seminary, Charlotte Campus, were taught by six full-time faculty and one affiliate member. These scholars, teachers, and preachers are themselves possessed of a deep and vital faith, which is reflected in their scholarly contributions, their leadership in local congregations, and their offering of their very best to the work of training pastors and leaders for bold commitment to Christ's ministry. 4
