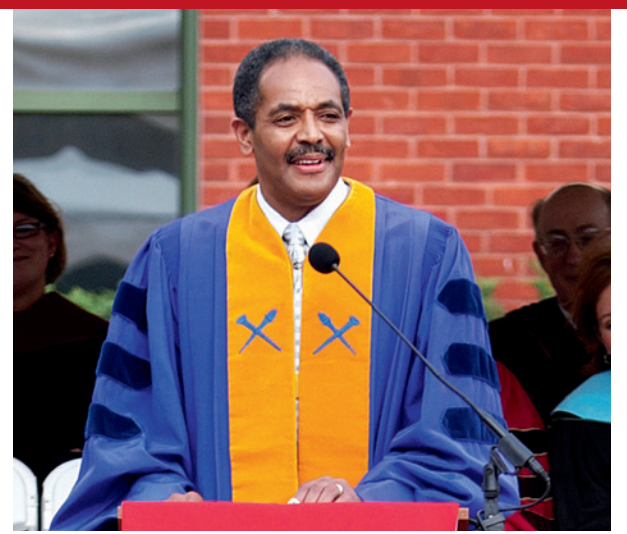

As part of the Seminary’s bicentennial, President Brian Blount led an 85-mile bike ride from Hampden-Sydney College to the Richmond quad—a symbolic reenactment of the Seminary’s 1898 journey from Farmville, the Seminary’s birthplace, to Richmond. The ride marked a new era for both institutions, led for the first time by Black presidents.

“We use a lot of the yield from our endowment to give scholarships that enable students to cover their theological education. Paying back education loans can be very difficult. Graduates are going into various forms of ministry, which, as we know, are not the kind of high-paying jobs that allow you to pay back student loans quickly, so I’m very happy about that.”

The Board of Trustees dinner allowed for a sneak preview of Dr. Blount’s presidential portrait. ## TRAVEL SEMINAR

# The Church in the World

From April 22 to May 12, close to two dozen students, alumni, and friends of the Seminary visited the Middle East. Led by Dr. Safwat Marzouk, Associate Professor of Old Testament, and Dr. Christine Luckritz Marquis, Associate Professor of Church History, the group was the first to experience a travel seminar since 2019.

Highlights of the trip included visiting the pyramids in Egypt, experiencing Sabbath on the Red Sea, watching the sun rise on Mount Sinai, exploring the history of the Jewish people, watching the full moon over the Sea of Galilee, and taking a journey to Jerusalem.

A spiritually and emotionally intense experience, the 21-day journey allowed students to experience firsthand what it means to be the church in the world. As President Brian Blount noted, “our travel seminars to Ghana, Korea, China, India, the Middle East, and Central America have been long-established ways in which our students see the church of Jesus Christ in ministry around the globe in new cultural and interfaith settings.”

Students and faculty wrote daily blog posts with reflections to share on the Seminary’s website and social media channels. Images posted to Facebook and Instagram were popular with viewers as they followed the pilgrims on their journey.

“Learning about different religious traditions reminds us how God’s table brings together people from different parts of the world,” said Dr. Marzouk. “In the midst of complex political and social realities, Christian communities in the Middle East continue to show resilience as they work toward peace, reconciliation, and justice in their contexts,” added Dr. Luckritz Marquis.

Through the historical intricacies of Egypt, Israel, and Palestine, travelers gained a valuable perspective of Biblical stories while building connections with people across the globe during their memorable trip.

### ON THE SHELF

**Jimmie Hawkins** (M.A.'86) has a new book titled *Unbroken and Unbowed: A History of Black Protest in America*. The book chronicles the history of Black protest in America from the 17th century to the present day.

**David Howell** (M.Div.'81) has a new book titled *Buried Dreamer*, a historical novel about an exiled Scottish Presbyterian minister who assists with the Underground Railroad in Virginia in the 1800s. Then a Presbyterian minister related to the same family seeks to prevent a threat to democracy in Charlottesville, VA, in 2021. The foreword is by Presiding Bishop Michael Curry of the Episcopal Church, and the book has been endorsed by

Peter Marty, editor/publisher of The Christian Century. Wipf and Stock Publishers. 2023. Available on Amazon. Howell's previous book, *Tethered to an Appalachian Curse: A Surprise Calling*, was released in 2021. As founder of the Festival of Homiletics, he continues to work as a consultant to Luther Seminary in St. Paul, MN.

**Philip W. Jacobs** (M.Div.'79) has a new book titled *The Other Person in the Picture: The Portrayal and Interpretation of Joseph the Carpenter*. Cascade Books. 2022.

**Stan Skreslet** (D.Min.'79) has a new book titled *Constructing Mission History: Missionary Initiative and Indigenous Agency in the Making of World Christianity*. Three master narratives currently dominate the analysis of modern mission history. One puts foreign missionaries at the heart of the story. A second emphasizes the colonial aspect of modern missions: Here, missionaries are not heroes, but villains, who are implicated in hegemonic schemes of imperial domination. Thirdly, mission history is subordinated to one of its outcomes, the advent of World Christianity. In this master narrative, the concept of contextualization looms large, bolstered by Sanneh's notion of translatability and emphasis on the agency of non-Westerners, who participate in and subtly shape the complex social processes of evangelization.

## 2023 SPRUNT LECTURES

## Undomesticated Faith

When Dr. Keri Day opened her series of four Sprunt lectures the week of May 1, she promised to share “experimental” thoughts that were emerging from the manuscript of an upcoming book.

Her Sprunt lectures, titled “Undomesticated Faith: An Afro-Pentecostal Theology of Spirit,” were driven by her own questioning and existential doubts, concerns, and hopes about what Christian faith is, the work it should do in the world, and how we image and imagine God.

Dr. Day, associate professor of constructive theology and African American religion at Princeton Theological Seminary, spoke about the Azusa Street Revival, which began in 1906 in Los Angeles—how it was a critique of segregated, capitalist society then and is still relevant today. With roots in the religious beliefs of enslaved persons from the southern United States, Azusa became a movement in which, pastored by William Seymour, “...Black domestic women moved into positions of leadership... and those who worshiped under them were transracial, transgenerational, and ultimately global.”

“When the Spirit moves, it participates in an economy of disruption, revealing a God who requires radical communion,” said Dr. Day. It frees theology “to be a discursive space and practice of wonder and freedom.” She also described how a decolonial theology of the Spirit attempts to avoid domestication of ideas about God and Christian faith. “I desperately want us to be released of needing to have the final say on divine reality.”

The 112th Sprunt Lectures also featured preaching by Dr. Kenyatta Gilbert, professor of homiletics at Howard University School of Divinity. With Luke 4:22 as his text, Dr. Gilbert catalogued the ills that plague society today: “social collapse, grotesque violence, political tribalism, environmental neglect, and ecological catastrophe, and what was laid bare by the COVID crisis—society’s despicable legacy of self-deceit, self-deception, self-obsession, and the abiding presence of unhealed racial wounds.”

“Something has shifted,” said Dr. Gilbert, “and how the church navigates its future course will determine if we can contribute anything of consequence that would support our agenda of advancing the reign of God here on earth.”

Sprunt Week included a luncheon presentation by Dr. Ted Wardlaw, retired president of Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary. The Distinguished Alumni Award was presented to Dr. Rosalyn Murphy, who has served in the Church of England for 23 years. And Dr. Hoffman Brown III, a member of Union’s class of 1981, was honored with the Black Alumni Association Trailblazer award.

## President Lapsley!

Dr. Jacqueline Lapsley arrived in Richmond in mid-June. As she and her husband, Greg Bezilla, settle into their Virginia home, Dr. Lapsley (known as “Jacq”) is diving into the UPSem community on both the Charlotte and Richmond campuses.

Dr. Lapsley’s credentials are impressive: She earned her Ph.D. from Emory University in 1999, her M.Div. from Princeton Theological Seminary in 1994, her M.A. from The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1991, and her A.B. from Smith College in 1987. Before accepting the role of president at Union, she was dean and vice president for Academic Affairs at Princeton Theological Seminary and a professor of Old Testament.

As the first woman to lead Union Presbyterian Seminary, Dr. Lapsley is a proven trailblazer. She is a learned scholar and well-respected author. As co-editor of *The Women’s Bible Commentary* and *After Exegesis: Feminist Biblical Theology*, her fresh perspective will propel UPSem to new areas of community engagement.

“The role of the seminary is to form leaders for gospel-filled ministries,” said Dr. Lapsley. “The gospel calls us to speak into difficult issues of the day, such as social justice. Christians are being called to leadership—in communities and congregations—and are a powerful voice in society. Theological education helps people thrive wherever they are called.”

Dr. Lapsley is a ruling elder in the Presbyterian Church. She is also the proud mother of two adult children. Welcome to Union, Dr. Lapsley!
